Speakers & Workshops

May 2020 - MEETING CANCELLED

Due to the Ventura County guidelines for social distancing, there will be no meeting or workshop in May. However, our contracted May meeting speaker, **Gina Perkes**, has <u>a fabulous website</u>, <u>a blog</u>, a Facebook page (Gina Perkes Design) and has written four books and made many videos. Her store, the Copper Needle, is providing curbside service to her customers in Payson, Arizona, which is one hour north of Phoenix.







She is also donating mask making kits from her storefront for customers to sew masks for health care workers. Elastic is being donated by Moda Fabrics to fabric stores who are making masks!

Gina's workshop forMay has also been cancelled. BUT, there is now a "<u>Virtual Quilt Show</u>" online which has recently been developed by Gammill, the longarm quilting machine manufacturer. There are 19 different quilt teachers on the site, with many different choices of classes. Gina is teaching classes in ruler work, free motion quilting, and several more. Did you know -----

- ♦ That the first CQA quilt show had over 400 quilts....so many that some were hung over chairs.
- ♦ That CQA quilt shows were hung as a maze for many years.
- ♦ That a professional auctioneer was hired to sell small quilts, made by members, at two shows.
- ♦ That a fashion show of embellished clothing was held at a show, complete with an above ground ramp for the member models.
- ♦ One show engaged a professional singer, who gave a performance before the show opened....very early in the morning.
- ♦ The printed newsletter once had an anonymous cartoonist.
- ♦ That Mercury Savings Bank hosted free luncheons for the guild.
- ♦ That Sarah Beth Tennison was president three times.
- ♦ That CQA once had night meetings (a failed effort to split the group).
- ♦ That Ventura College offered a color and design class particularly for CQA quilters.
- ♦ That Oxnard Adult School offered classes in Electric Quilt, designed just for CQA.
- ♦ That CQA had two group-wide Round Robins (1998)
- ♦ That CQA once had up to 16 vendors listed in the newsletter.
- ♦ That CQA has had up to 20 mini groups.
- ♦ That CQA once produced a Cookbook! (Yes, some members Cook.)
- ♦ That CQA once played 'Strip Poker'....and it was great fun!
- ♦ That 2001 was the formal start for Community Quilts, although there had been 'sew-ins' in previous years.
- ♦ That CQA met in the Camarillo Library, then the Trinity Presbyterian Church, then the Orchid Building, then the Serra Center, then the Freedom Center and now our present location.
- ♦ While at the Orchid Building we were asked to carpool as the lot was not large enough for the membership.

Masks for safety

Many of you have taken on the task of making masks. I would like to give a shout out to all those who are risking their lives to get us food and supplies. All those making masks to help protect our community. Thank you kindly!

So many different styles to choose from! I never thought I would use all of my mother's store bought binding. Or have had the experience of looking for supplies only to be told they were sold out - of elastic, pre wound bobbins, pre made double fold binding to mention a few. I am proud to say, to date I have made 27. Not a big number but a little help. Not one cost a cent to the recipient - all will be given freely.

Social media has provided lots of stories and photos. One of our members, *Dena Miskel*, made over 300 masks! She is a "one woman mask factory" and is currently making 25 a day. One member offered a mask to the mail man who wanted to know how much, and was shocked it was free. She also made 15 masks for a friend's co-workers and many for the hospital. Another had a handy man call and ask if the guild sells masks. He was told no and given the five he needed for free. He was beyond surprised and stated they loved them, thanking the guild. Some have given masks to neighbors. Others have made masks for their family members, friends and local health care workers.

Some members have gathered supplies and made them available for others to use when supplies were limited. Some have had to adjust to the demands of parents working at home with children and schooling on top of everything else that life throws their way.

WOW! This year has been something. As we all navigate this new experience, it is with pride we can say, "when there is a need we are here - our sewing machines are ready." We can spring into action and get things done. You ladies are truly amazing! Your ability to get things done is inspiring! Your masks are beautiful. I wonder when the lock down is over how many beautifully colored masks will be out there?

I am so proud to be a member of this guild! Keep up the good work! I know some of you are balancing a lot because life does not stop. Be safe out there and wear your mask!


