Q. What is it about quilting that makes your heart sing?

A. Quilt classes that challenge me. Quilt shows, quilt magazines and other quilters that inspire me with their use of beautiful fabrics and designs.

Q. What is your specialty?

A. Needle turn applique, English paper piecing (EPP), sashiko and folk-art quilts. I like to repurpose old linens too.

Q. What quilt are you most proud of? Show us if possible.

A. A quilt that I finally finished last year, after deciding that the pattern was too busy. I removed 36 hand pieced hexagon flowers to simplify it. (It would have been nice to see that earlier, before


I hand appliqued everything down. But, maybe that's why it was a UFO for several years.) The needle turn wheels and remaining flowers, as well as the yo-yo's, were all hand stitched. The machine quilting was fun!

Q. What is your new favorite? or What is your old favorite?

A. Absolutely, my sit down longarm, which is both old and new. I bought my first sit down quilting machine when they first came out and had it for 5 years. Then I graduated to a stand up longarm, but only for one year.

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A. Be married to a wonderful man for 40 years, have two thriving older daughters, have a home in Ojai (although it gets a little hot in the summer) and enough space – two sewing rooms – to store my many machines

and fabrics and yarn and notions and craft books and......

Q. What part of you does quilting feed?

A. My need to be challenged and have new experiences to learn about people and craft history. Which translates into quilt and family history trips, taking classes, going to retreats and exploring new places.

Q. Some day in the future I would like to



A. I will travel again! My motto is "Haven't been everywhere but it's on my list! Lots of quilt shows I haven't seen, classes and teachers to meet. Bucket list of Houston, Paducah, the European Patchwork Festival in France, and the Academy of Applique in Virginia. And I'll return to the Folk Art School in Minnesota, the Festival of Quilts in England, the Amish Retreat Center in Indiana, the Cowgirl Retreat in Montana, and Missouri Star. (See my picture?!!) See, now that I've written it down, it will happen!

Q. Tell us something you would like other quilters/CAQ members to know about you?

A. Like many quilters, I began sewing at a young age. I also taught myself to knit and crochet. When I was 30 I learned how to weave and spin, and did that for 20 years. I love to learn, so embroidery, kumihimo, sashiko, rug braiding and hooking, natural dyeing and felting were hobbies as well. I started to teach weaving, but my big dream was to have my own store. Lou Ann Schlichter agreed to let me sell knitting yarn in her Ojai store "Heartwarmers Mercantile". I was in awe of her quilting expertise and the beautiful fabrics she displayed and sold. I started a "Sewing for Beginners" website and sold fabric and classes online. Then my 22-year-old daughter asked me to hand applique figures on a quilt she was making — and I haven't stopped quilting since! Full circle — my daughter now has my old loom.

Q. If you could change something about quilting what would it be?

A. I wish that quilters would be less critical about other's work. Even professional judges have something positive to say – always. Encouragement and praise brings out the best in quilters. If they are proud enough to show their quilt, be happy for them.

A. Have all this safe and free time to work on quilt projects (UFO's) (Thank you Maribeth!). I've realized I only need to finish the quilts I truly want, and I'll repurpose the rest. Lots of table runners and tote bags this summer.

CRYPTID CREATURE QUILT CHALLENGE

Behavioral Notes: Eats small misbehaving children and un-Lenten Catholics! Transforms during full moons. Legend says, the Rougarou is afraid of frogs and all other swamp creatures. I imagine it must be tough for the Rougarou to be constantly surrounded by things it's frightened of! It's been known to burst into flames when it comes in contact with salt. Habitat Type: Bayous or Swamps, recent sightings have been closer to the city.

Location: New Orleans, Louisiana, my inspiration for this "art quilt" was our cancelled summer trip to New Orleans! We plan our trips a year in advance, so we were terribly disappointed like everyone else. Learning about art quilts and Louisiana swamp legends was my way of coping with all the unexpected turn of events!

Research Type: Extensive... TV watching! I love pseudoscience and have fun watching spooky shows about cryptids, ghosts, myths, and monsters. In researching ideas, I found a short clip of A&E's Cajun Justice (think Louisiana version of COPS.) Link below:

Comments: So, the challenge rules stated that I had to have fun, use materials that I had on hand, and to try at least one new technique that I've always wanted to try.

At out last meeting while shopping the free table I grabbed a bag of someone's drunkard's paths scraps. It was a bunch of quarter circles in blue and gray batiks (what was I thinking ¼ circles?). Tucked among the scraps was one whole circle of gray batik that had somehow escaped the rotary blade! The Moon was done!

The charcoal tonal fabric I had from a ½ yd bundle of Painter's Palette from Connecting Threads. The rest of the fabrics are scraps from mask making and last year's Halloween costume.

I wanted to try making an art quilt and to try thread sketching. My machine still scares me and using a zigzag stich with a darning foot was threatening! No needles were broken in making of this quilt. I discovered it was fun! This mini quilt is my first attempt at both an art quilt and thread sketching.

Cryptid Observation Report 2:

Comments: My big challenge and technique turned out to be using a preprinted panel and coming up with a design. I ended up cutting the panel apart, and spent far too much time playing with layout, looking online for ideas, and trying more layouts. Being limited by only an additional two yards of space fabric that I bought at Road 2 CA in January, plus scraps of navy blue, it was a real pain. Ha! I only had enough navy blue for 2" double fold binding, so that's also a new adventure. Makes my UFO challenge quilts sound like fun!
