- 3. Quilts were used as currency by pioneers during the expansion into the Western United States.
- The term "Quilting Bee" originated in the 1800s where communities came together to quilt and socialize; a precursor to the modern quilting retreats!

The CQA Pizza Box Challenge

The pizza boxes were distributed to participants with the instruction sheet inside at the September meeting.

When you participate, you will need to choose a block that you would like to use in a quilt, include directions for making that block, and select fabric that you will include in the box as it is passed from member to member IN SECRET each month. Or perhaps you want to include choices of blocks for participants to make.

Every month each participant will make ONE BLOCK based on the directions taped inside the lid of the box and using the fabric provided in the box. We will not be exchanging boxes during the December meeting and will conclude next July when we return the boxes to the owner of the box – the label on the front. It is exciting to open the box after so many months and find those beautiful blocks ready for your quilt.



Over twenty-five years ago, my daughter and son both made guilts, but I never thought I had the time. Then when my father-in-law moved in with us because of his health, I knew I needed something to do to occupy my time at home. A friend encouraged me to take a Ventura County Adult Education Quilting Class. I arrived at the first class with polyester fabric and no machine. Class members scrounged up cotton fabric for me and set up one of the loaner machines for me. After my initial class experience, in appreciation for my care, my father-in-law insisted on buying a brand new Bernina for me. Armed with the new machine and the basic knowledge from the class, I began a new adventure. Though I had never fancied myself as an artist, I felt that I could copy designs and fake being creative.

One day, after progressing in my basic quilting skills, Diane Lotspeich told me that she wished she had an empty space 15 feet long and about eight feet wide to accommodate a longarm quilting machine that one of her friends had for sale. Being a neophyte, I had no idea what she was talking about. She explained how such a machine

could easily quilt an entire quilt. That night I literally dreamt about a machine that could finish my pile of pieced tops. The next day, Diane gave me her friend's contact information. I arranged to see what this mechanical wonder of the sewing world looked like. Before I knew it, I found myself to be the proud owner of an ancient green Gammill which was built by Nolting. The serial number included the initials of Nolting's children, indicating that it was indeed from a very early manufacturing lot. I paid the whopping sum of \$3000. For this amount, the owners willingly delivered it to my house, set it up, and showed me how it worked. There were no computerized parts and a small bobbin. There was a difficult and tedious dial that took two hands to hand crank which moved the needle up or down when the machine wasn't on. There was no stitch regulator. It maintained a constant stitch per minute and no pausing was possible. When I moved the handlebars faster, the stitches would be longer. If I moved the handlebars slower, the stitches were shorter. Amazingly, I loved that thing. That is, I loved it when the thread would refrain from breaking and no thread tension problems arose. Often Diane would help me figure things out when problems occurred. This was the humble beginning of my fledgling quilting business.

After several years my husband, Ted, got excited when he found out that new longarms were computerized. I wanted nothing to do with computers associated with quilting. Finally he convinced me that he needed an embroidery machine and that Innova longarms also did embroidery. I eventually gave in and we purchased a brand new Innova from the dealer at Road to California. After Ted and I attended a two and a half day class, we were able to figure out the basics. The old tried and true Gammill became neglected. Eventually I gave it away. The new machine was almost immediately in constant use as word of mouth multiplied my business almost as fast

as I was able to make use of the new machine's capacity.

One year after we purchased the machine, COVID hit. Innova dealers had new and demonstration machines with nowhere to sell them. We took advantage of the good deals that abounded. It turns out you can run two machines in about the same amount of time it takes to operate one machine. While running one machine on its first row pass, you can be setting up the second machine with a new quilt. Then it's usually time to advance the first quilt to a new section. This then gives way to advancing the second quilt on the other machine. I certainly stay busy.

My favorite quilts are scrappy ones. I'm a Bonnie Hunter fan. She offers a free mystery quilt every year. I've completed the last nine mysteries. I'm not finished with this year's mystery, but I'll get it done before the next one begins on the Friday after Thanksgiving.

I also enjoy Project Quilting. Initially Jody Solorio challenged me to try. It's great fun to view Jody's always very creative and submitted at the last minute entries. I can't believe I've now completed 3 years of Project Quilting submissions. Another pursuit I've had is Laura Heine collage quilts. I've completed the camel. The giraffe is finished but not quilted. The rabbit still needs to be tied down.

My quilts are not museum pieces.
Continuous line pantographs serve my quilts very well. Computerized quilting is kind of cheating. There's no personality to it. When I hand guided the Gammill, I was putting myself into the quilt. Now the machine does it all, after I set it up. Last year I took an online course from Kaylee Porter who does Graffiti Quilting. I learned a lot, enjoyed the class, and I'm happy with my practice quilt. I came to the conclusion that I'm not willing to put in the practice to get good at free motion or custom quilting. Pantographs are an easy

out for me. Some of you make fantastic quilts that deserve custom quilting. Most any quilt could be enhanced with the right custom quilting. It's easier and cheaper for me to use a digitized pantograph. Because of my husband's engineering and computer background, he is able to make custom pantographs. Ted is currently into embroidery in a big way. It makes him cringe to think that I would send a digitized pantograph across a quilt that has his embroidery work on it! Oh well....
