
Quilting Facts

WHO'S WHO



by
SHIRLEY BERTOLINO

I requested that Shirley Bertolino consider being our featured quilter in an upcoming newsletter. She graciously agreed and sent me a synopsis of, as she put it, "Some information about my quilting interest". My thank you to Shirley for accommodating my request.

Shirley comes from a long line of quilters. She grew up on a farm in Illinois with quilts on the beds. Both Shirley's paternal great grandmother and her maternal great grandmother were quilt makers. So being a maker must have been in her genes. Now Nadia Muetting, Shirley's granddaughter is following in Shirley's steps and is a member of CQA. Shirley studied for four semesters under Carrie Arnold in a Quilt Making Program through the Ventura Unified Adult Education Program during the Bi-centennial years.

Sharon Norbutas extended an invitation to Shirley to share her VC Textile class final exam research paper on "Batting" as a lecturer at a CQA meeting. Sharon then encouraged Shirley to join the Camarillo Quilters Association and also, introduced her to the NQA, National Quilting Association.

Shirley writes:

I wanted an inexpensive "at home" hobby to do in the evenings while my VC instructor husband corrected homework and prepared exams. Gradually, I realized I should make some money to support this, "increasing in cost" pastime. With that in mind I asked myself if I might learn to appraise or judge quilts. I set out to take a two-day appraisal course in Lincoln, Nebraska and the NQA three-day judging course in Charleston, West Virginia. One task is solitary with legal considerations. The other is social with a sharing of the responsibility. After several apprenticeship experiences and completing the written test, I passed the NQA oral and demonstration examinations in June of 1995 in Riverside, California.

Judging opportunities came in various forms through the following years. 4-H (twice); Ojai and Santa Paula Shows (5 shows); County Fair (14 events); State Fair (5 events); Guild Shows (20 total); 11 guilds in California plus Omaha and San

Antonio); Pacific International Quilt Festival (3 events); National Quilting Association (1); Road to California (1); Hoffman Challenge (1).

Teaching and lecturing came my way. I taught two classes on judging. I lectured seven times on judging. I wrote a manual on setting up the room and judging day protocol. I was "Show Judging Chairperson" for six different sponsors. I was Chairperson of the NQA Master Quilt Program for two years.

Shirley remembers several unique experiences:

The first time quilts were judged for the Road to California was in 1996. I was asked to aide. At that time Anita Shackelford (Head Judge), John Flynn (the first time he had judged), and Paula Nadelstern (was unable to judge due to a blizzard in New York). Quilts were delivered at 9 AM by the "Mail To" receiving volunteer. Quilts were "naked", that is, no protective outer casing, and they were stacked on the soiled carpeting of the hotel luggage carts. There were no tables in the judging room, so quilts were stacked on the floor along one wall. There was no paperwork and only two of us "aides". Anita took charge and started by ordering tables. We held up each opened quilt and she made a decision as to what category it should be placed into. John would carry each quilt to its designated category stack. There were no scribes. Anita and John judged each category and she also documented the award placements. The other aide and I hustled to get each entry open for them to study and then we folded, moving on to the now available tables.

Another experience was being the only judge for a mountain guild's "first show to be judged". It was August and the Christmas tree was still up in the corner of my living room. I had quilts laid out on the living room carpet for judging and relied on my husband as the only aide.

Once, I was on the verification team for an NQA Show in Indiana. The shipping boxes were delivered safely to us. The night before judging the boxes of quilt entries had been sequestered in a truck on a farm driveway. The farm dog was barking so intensely, the Show Judging Chairman's husband got up to check out the ruckus. An offering of meat from the kitchen drew the dog to the porch and a skunk took his time to wander out from under the truck.

One less fortunate memory was tripping off the concrete curb at 8AM as I hurriedly walked to the "Road to California" judging occurring in another building. I sustained a rather painful injury to my hip. By mid-evening I had to judge...sitting down. The other 2 judges were very gracious.

Another experience was at the NQA Show in Reno Nevada.

The judging was done in a 2nd floor room in a casino All four walls were covered floor to ceiling with mirrors. We three judges focused 100% on the judging table as the movement of 16 aides were mirrored by 4 walls. It was very distracting.

Question: "Did I earn enough to support my quilt making hobby?"

Answer: "The contract fee, all travel expenses, hotel costs and one day of meals helped. However, new classes, vendor shopping, and discovery of ALL THOSE BOOKS, made me glad my husband kept correcting homework and preparing exams.

Baked Ravioli

1 package frozen ravioli

1 pound ground turkey



1 jar pasta sauce

1 1/2 cups shredded Mozzarella cheese

Brown turkey and drain. In 11x7x2-inch baking pan, layer 1 cup pasta sauce, half of frozen ravioli, half of turkey, and half of cheese. Repeat layering with 1 cup sauce and remaining pasta and turkey. Top with remaining pasta sauce. Bake uncovered at 425 degrees for 30 minutes. Top with remaining cheese.
